- AGE LIMIT: Do not use under 12 weeks (3 months) of age (Reason: fever during the first 12 weeks of life needs to be documented in a medical setting and if present, your infant needs a complete evaluation.) Call the office IMMEDIATELY if your child is under 3 months old with a rectal temperature of 100.4 F or higher.
- **MEASURING the DOSAGE:** Syringes and droppers are more accurate than teaspoons. If possible, use the syringe or dropper that comes with the medicine. If not, medicine syringes are available at pharmacies. If you use a teaspoon, it should be a measuring spoon. Remember that 1 level teaspoon equals 5 ml, and that ½ teaspoon equals 2.5 ml.
- FREQUENCY: Repeat every 4-6 hours as needed. Do not give more than 5 times a day.

If you use a teaspoon, it should be a measuring spoon. Regular spoons are not reliable. Remember that 1 level teaspoon equals 5 ml and that ½ teaspoon equals 2.5 ml.
- FREQUENCY: Repeat every 6-8 hours as needed for fever or pain
